Introduction

Alameda County is characterized by rich geography, diversity, and culture. The County provides a range of services to residents. The Board of Supervisors' adoption of this two-year Legislative Platform supports the vision that Alameda County is recognized as one of the best counties in which to live, work, and do business.

The County provides for the basic needs of the most vulnerable populations and is responsible for health and human services for the entire County, including social safety net programs. The United States Congress and the State Legislature craft legislation regarding the County's mandated services and provide over 60% of the County's General Fund revenue, including Medicaid and Medicare charges for services. In addition to the broad array of countywide governance responsibilities, the County is also responsible for the stewardship of the Unincorporated County and provides municipal services such as police, fire, road repair, land use planning, and housing and economic development. To best serve the diverse needs of County residents, Alameda County needs dependable and equitable revenue streams and local control to provide flexibility in delivering services.


Vision 2036 is Alameda County's comprehensive effort to set a course for a decade that anticipates community challenges and maximizes the County's ability to meet residents' needs in a rapidly changing world. Vision 2036 provides a roadmap to look at demographic trends that will impact Alameda County residents and informs how the County should deliver services. Vision 2036 includes 10X goals for the County in the following areas:

- Eliminate Homelessness
- Health for All
- Employment for All
- Eliminate Poverty & Hunger
- Crime-free County
- Accessible & Integrated Infrastructure

Vision 2036 is the foundation for County actions and this Legislative Platform, including an emphasis on addressing homelessness, combating climate change, ensuring an accurate Census count, and protecting individuals regardless of immigration status.

County Overview

Alameda County was established in 1853. The County's almost 821 square miles encompass a varied geography ranging from bay wetlands to rolling open spaces to hillside lakes and streams. Alameda County is the seventh most populous county in California, with a dense urban corridor and suburban and rural communities. The County has 14 incorporated cities and several unincorporated communities that range from urban to agricultural and a population of over 150,000.



Alameda County is governed by a five-member Board of Supervisors elected by popular vote. Countywide elected officials include the Auditor-Controller/Clerk-Recorder, Assessor, Treasurer-Tax Collector, District Attorney, and Sheriff/Coroner. The Board of Supervisors is responsible for providing policy direction, approving the County budget, and representing the County in a number of areas including its dependent special districts. The County Administrator advises, assists, and acts as an agent for the Board of Supervisors in all matters under the Board's jurisdiction.



Population

Alameda County is the seventh most populous county in California, with 14 incorporated cities and several unincorporated communities.

The total population is estimated to be 1,641,869 as of January 2024, a 0.5 percent decrease from 2023. Oakland is the seat of County government and the largest city.


15.7 percent of the County's population is age 65 or older. This population is projected to increase to 21.1 percent by 2032 based on data from the California Department of Finance.


Alameda County is characterized by rich ethnic and cultural diversity. Population decline has occurred with the high rate of domestic migration to other states, decrease international immigration, and a lower natural net level of births over deaths than in previous years. Based on the U.S. Census Bureau 2018-2022 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates, 33.3 percent of the population is foreign born and there is no majority racial or ethnic group. According to the California Department of Education, 90 languages were spoken by English language learners I nthe K-12 public school systems in Alameda County in 2023-2024.

The County's workforce continues to reflect the rich diversity of the communities served.




County Budget

The Board of Supervisors adopts a balanced budget by June 30th annually and begins the new fiscal year on July 1st. The FY 2024-2025 Final Budget includes appropriations of over \$4.6 billion. The Budget is divided into four program areas: Public Assistance, Health Care Services, Public Protection, and General Government. The County budget is financed by revenues from State, federal, and local governments; revenues from property and other taxes; charges for services; fines, forfeitures, and penalties; and other revenues. For FY 2024-25, it is estimated that the County will receive about 58.5% of General Fund revenue from State and federal sources, including Medicaid and Medicare charges for services.



The majority of County appropriations are dedicated to providing essential services to residents. Together, Health Care Services, Public Assistance, and Public Protection account for over 83.8% of total County General Fund appropriations.



Only 28 percent of General Fund revenue is discretionary revenue that the Board of Supervisors has the authority to allocate to meet County needs. Most of this discretionary revenue is used to fund the County's mandated share of costs for programs that receive federal and State funding.

57.3 percent of Alameda County's discretionary revenue comes from property taxes, although the County receives only about 15 percent of the property tax collected.



Over time, redevelopment agencies' share of property taxes should be distributed to other entities.


This discretionary revenue funds many of the essential services for County residents, including social safety net programs, which are increasingly important given the rising cost of living in the County.

Cost of Living

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, Alameda County's median annual household income in 2022 was \$122,488 with an average household size of 2.78 persons. 10.1 percent of Alameda County's population is living below the federal poverty level. For seniors, the percentage living below the poverty line increases to 11.5%.

According to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology's Living Wage Calculator, an adult with two children in Alameda County would need to earn \$148,116.80 annually (\$71.21/hour) to cover costs for housing, food, healthcare, transportation, childcare, and taxes. This is equivalent to more than four full-time jobs at the California minimum wage of \$16/hour and more than \$120,000 higher than the federal poverty level for a family of three. Additionally, research from the California Budget and Policy Center finds that on average, a single mother in Alameda County would have to spend over 60% of her income to afford center-based childcare for two children and over 50% of her income on housing.



Safety Net Programs

Alameda County, along with its community-based partners, is the safety net for County residents. A partial list of services provided by the County that are dependent on State funding or funds passed-through from the federal government include California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids (CalWORKs) and Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF), CalFresh and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Medi-Cal, In-Home Supportive Services, Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and State Suppementary Payment (SSP), mental health services, meals to seniors and disabilities, subsidized child care, subsidized homelessness programs, and employment services. According to the latest California Poverty Measure, a comprehensive poverty measure that accounts for the regional cost of living and California-specific safety net programs, 14.5% of Alameda County residents lived in poverty.

A recent California Poverty Measure report also found that social safety net programs helped keep almost three million California residents out of deep poverty and moderated the impact of poverty, especially for children. During times of economic hardships, many people rely on safety net services; however, even in times of economic expansion, safety net programs are critical to helping residents meet basic needs given the high cost of living in Alameda County.

County residents receives direct assistance from the County of Alameda




During the Great Recession, State funding for core health and human services programs was reduced dramatically (cutting over \$15 billion between 2008 and 2013). There have been some restorations over the past few years but many core public services remain underfunded following years of deep cuts.

Rising Cost of Housing

A housing crisis exists across the nation, the state, in the nine Bay Area counties, and specifically in Alameda County. The National Low-Income Housing Coalition's 2024 Out of Reach Report states that no state, metropolitcan area, or county across the U.S. hit its lowest point in over 30 years.


Alameda County's median home value as of October 2024 was \$1,100,000 up 2.3% from the prio year, but down from the peak in June 2022 of \$1,170,000. Over the past 30 years, while the market has had several major impacts, housing has proven resilient with a constant increase in the value, even after accomidting the dot com boom and bust of the early 2000s and the foreclosure crisis of 2008-2012.



The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) reports the Fair Market Rent (FMR) of a two-bedroom in the Oakland-Fremont HUD Metro Area as \$2,590 per month for FY 2024, up from \$2,405 in 2023 (an increase of 7.1%). This follows several years of increasing FMR including a 5.7% increase from FY 2022 to 2023.

Almost 63% of County households are living in housing that is affordable at their income level (including low-income residents who are living in either pubclicly subsidized affordable housing, who have access to housing vouchers or naturally occurring affordable housing). Unfortunately, approximately 37% are not able to afford housing. Almost 19% are paying more than 30% of their income for rent (109,000 households) and an additional 16% (93,000

households) are paying more than 50% of their income on housing. Finally, 2% of our households are homeless.



Unhoused

The continued rising cost of housing affordability is a contributor to the homelessness crisis in the State of California, including Alameda County. On January 25, 2024, Alameda County conducted the 2024 Homeless Point-In-Time County and Survey. The Homeless Response System relies on this biennial count and survey of those experiencing homelessness to gain a better understanding of the prevalence of and circumstances surrounding homelessness in Alameda and its cities. The data is foundational to investing in housing and programs to the scale necessary to reduce homelessness and evaluating the impact of housing efforts to date.

The 2024 Alameda County Point-in-Time Count showed a 3% decrease in homelessness since 2022, with **9,450** individuals experiencing homelessness during a single 24-hour period.

Alameda County continues to invest in anti-homeless strategies, including the 2016 voter-approved Measure A1 General Obligation Bond, with the goal of creating and preserving 3,800 units of affordable housing rental and ownership housing throughout Alameda County.

Climate Change

Climate change disproportionately harms economically vulnerable communities and individuals. Climate change is already impacting the County's residents today with increased droughts, fires, floods, and public health issues such as heat waves and wildfire smoke.

In the past few years, our community has faced floods, heat waves, wildfires, unhealthy air quality from wildfire smoke, and power shut-offs related to increased fire risk – sometimes at the same time. Counties are on the front lines of responding to impacts of global climate change and it is critical to ensure that State and federal resources and policies support the County's ability to respond immediately and plan for the future. At the same time, shifting to a clean energy economy provides opportunities for job growth and helps ensure a healthy environment for Alameda County residents. The Board of Supervisors actively supports equitable policies to secure resources to combat and prepare our communities for climate change impacts and to accelerate and intensify the actions and investments needed for a sustainable low carbon future.

Race and Equity

The County supports policies and practices that promote equitable outcomes for communities marginalized by historically rooted systems of neglect and oppression so that all people can thrive. Policies and practices should promote equity, and work to eliminate disparities based on race, ethnicity, sovereignty, national origin, immigration status, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, age, disability status, and socioeconomic status. The County supports policies that address all forms of systemic oppression, particularly institutional and structural racism, which have played a central role historically and currently in creating and perpetuating persistent social and health inequities. The County supports programs, policies, and funding to address community reparations for African Americans. Policies and programs should include strategies to identify and address existing disparities including collecting disaggregated data and utilizing equity metrics to measure outcomes; promoting community participation in shaping solutions that most impact

them; targeting interventions to address root causes of disparate outcomes; and a process of continuous quality improvement to achieve equity.

Revenue

The County supports funding flexibility, including the ability to use new funds to backfill lost revenue, allowing the County to address unique issues in our communities. The County supports efforts to ensure funding opportunities address persistent economic and social inequity.

The County supports uniform, fair and equitable tax policies that reduce economic burdens for vulnerable populations.

Guiding Principles

The Vision, Mission, Values and Vision 2036 grew from extensive collaboration involving Alameda County leaders and other local officials to address County trends and promote communities that are vibrant, prosperous, safe, healthy, and inclusive. These shared visions can be achieved through the six 10X Goals.

Vision

Alameda County is recognized as one of the best counties in which to live, work, and do business.

Mission

To enrich the lives of Alameda County residents through visionary policies and accessible, responsible, and effective services.

Values

- Integrity, honesty, and respect fostering mutual trust.

- Fiscal stewardship reflecting the responsible management of resources.
- Customer service built on commitment, accessibility, and responsiveness.
