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# EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, the County of Alameda has taken extraordinary steps to protect public health while supporting individuals, families, and businesses by addressing the health, economic, and social impacts of the public health emergency. Federal and State emergency funds have been crucial in enabling the County to invest in strategies to mitigate COVID-19 impacts. The County utilized its \$333.2 million in CARES Act funding – a direct allocation to the County and a portion of the State of California’s allocation that was distributed to the County – to finance housing and quarantine of vulnerable individuals, testing, contact tracing, vaccinations, emergency food, economic aid, and other expenses to support the County’s COVID-19 response. The County has also utilized Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) financial assistance primarily for medical, \$19.1 million, and sheltering expenses, \$48.7 million, a total of \$67.8 million. The County received \$147.0 million in Rental Assistant Funds - \$133.8 million from the Federal Government and \$13.2 million from the State of California. The funds were used to provide financial assistance to 9,715 families from April 2021 through May 2023.

The County has also been allocated \$324.6 million in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds. To guide the use of ARPA funds, the County used a data-driven, inclusive process to balance immediate public health needs and long-term investments in community recovery, with a focus on equity, in line with the U.S. Treasury’s Final Rule. This report serves as the ARPA Recovery Plan and Performance Report through June 30, 2025, and summarizes the allocations, expenditures, encumbrances and performance data for the County’s ARPA funds. As the County spends the remaining ARPA encumbered funds on these critical projects, the County is looking at other sources of revenue to continue to fund community services, in particular, in the area of homelessness. Below is a table summarizing allocation and expenditure data through June 30, 2025:

## USE OF FUNDS

On March 11, 2021, the President signed ARPA into law, which, in addition to other provisions, allocated \$350 billion to State, local, territorial, and tribal governments to fight the pandemic and support families & businesses struggling with its public health and economic impacts, maintain vital public services, and build a strong, resilient, and equitable recovery by making investments that support long-term growth

and opportunity. Of the \$350 billion, \$65.1 billion is allocated to counties, and Alameda County's allocation is \$324.6 million distributed to the County in two tranches. Consistent with the County's inclusive approach in budgeting and program development, the Board of Supervisors held a special public listening session to solicit community input on how to allocate ARPA funds, receiving over \$1.3 billion in community proposals. The County incorporated that feedback in approving allocations for the first tranche of ARPA funds. In October of 2022 the Board of Supervisors after hearing updates regarding the American Rescue Plan Act directed staff to develop an allocation for the second tranche of ARPA funds which were allocated in December of 2022. The final allocations included \$159.7 million to be administered by the Health Care Services Agency for the continued provision of COVID testing, tracing, vaccination, and other needed COVID mitigation services, \$56.5 million to the Alameda County Social Services Agency for the continued provision of emergency food and other basic needs countywide, \$28.0 million to highly impacted communities, families, and businesses in the urban unincorporated parts of Alameda County, and \$80.4 million for programming to highly impacted communities, families, and businesses throughout Alameda County. The Board of Supervisors has taken subsequent actions regarding allocations, budgets, programmatic detail, and criteria for programs within these spending categories which are outlined in the more detailed project summaries.

**PUBLIC HEALTH**

ARPA funding has allowed the County to continue vital Public Health programming to protect residents from COVID-19 and mitigate health effects of the virus. Below is a high-level summary of the Public Health programs funded by ARPA. More detail for each program can be found on the Project Overview pages:

**Vaccination Program**

The vaccination program partnered with community providers, with a focus on underserved communities, to ensure all 1.7 million County residents have access to COVID-19 vaccines. ARPA funds are used to contract with mobile vaccination providers who can be deployed to community organizations, schools, businesses, and faith-based organizations across the County. The clinics are typically open to the public

and serve between 20-200 people per day. Vaccination programs are a key component in the County's 'Community Coalition' model of COVID-19 response and recovery which aims to partner with trusted community groups to ensure we are serving our entire diverse population. Vaccination providers also serve homebound individuals and those in congregate care settings.

### ***Testing***

The testing program provided free accessible COVID-19 testing to residents regardless of insurance or documentation status. ARPA funds are used to partner with 11 organizations that provide testing and can link residents with linkages to whole person care, social services, and access to COVID-19 treatment. The community testing provided in this program ensures that the most vulnerable communities can address their health needs while minimizing further spread. This program has measures in place to address language and digital access barriers, and look to minimize racial, economic, and health disparities associated with COVID-19.

### ***Hoteling / Services***

The hoteling program continues to provide temporary emergency shelter locations for homeless people who are COVID+, exposed to COVID, or at high risk from COVID to prevent community spread of the virus. Services include shelter management, meals, connections to physical and mental health services, and housing support.

### ***Nursing Registry***

The County is utilizing registry nurses to reduce the spread of COVID-19 by providing clinical outreach and guidance to at-risk populations, support contact tracing, refer disadvantaged individuals and families for social services, and support the COVID-19 vaccination and testing programs. In addition, the registry nurses investigate, manage, and mitigate outbreaks in schools, workplaces, shelters, health care facilities, and correctional institutions as well as provide health information to all residents within communities disproportionately impacted by the disease. These services support County efforts to reduce community transmission of COVID-19 among vulnerable populations and increase vaccination rates in the County.

### ***Communications***

This program has developed and implemented a comprehensive communications plan ensuring that COVID-19 response information is disseminated in a relevant, accessible, and culturally competent manner. Communications include social media, digital newsletters, posters, billboards, websites, and communications with community partners to establish a cohesive brand and align County health messaging. Using Census data, the communications program has targeted priority populations in the County.

### **Capital Investment**

ARPA funding in the amount of \$45.5 million is allocated to capital expenditures in County owned critical health care facilities dedicated to COVID-19 treatment and mitigation. These include 2 hospitals, 2 residential mental health and 12 behavioral health facilities providing health care services to high-risk populations. These facilities have been assessed and projects have been prioritized to address life safety, critical equipment, and major maintenance needs. The projects have completed the preliminary engineering phase which included cost estimating, written justification for individual projects exceeding \$1 million, and the construction schedules have been coordinated with service providers to minimize impacts to the community. Construction on most of the projects has started and will be completed by December 31, 2026.

### **Other Health Services**

Other Public Health Expenses are for ongoing COVID and Mpox response and include the following areas: 1) project support for COVID data dashboard displays and data management; 2) COVID treatment support for underserved communities, including management of telemedicine to assist COVID cases with accessing available treatments; 3) provision of an appointment registration platform for testing and vaccinations for Alameda County residents; 4) translation, printing, interpretation, closed caption services for community meetings ASL, online meeting platform support, materials for community outreach and education, subscriptions for web-based platforms and 5) masks for priority individuals, vulnerable populations, low income neighborhoods and sensitive settings that do not have access to the high quality masks recommended on our website.

### ***Emergency Food***

This program includes meal preparation, meal or grocery delivery, food distribution, and support for the Alameda County Community Food Bank to support residents experiencing food insecurity due to the COVID-19 emergency.

### ***Child Care Grants***

This program has provided financial support to approximately 1,500 childcare providers impacted by the COVID-19 emergency. The grant program will provide the financial viability of providers to ensure they are able to continue to provide childcare.

### ***ARCH Grants***

The Alameda County Responsibility for Community Health (ARCH) program provided direct financial aid to residents who tested positive for COVID-19 and did not have sick leave or similar assistance. The \$1,250 one-time stipend was intended to help cover costs and allow the individual to safely self-isolate. Through June 30, 2023, 1,200 County residents received financial assistance, with 75% residing in the cities of Oakland and Hayward with those recipients concentrated in neighborhoods particularly impacted by the pandemic.

### ***Emergency Shelter Grants***

The Social Services Agency's Emergency Shelter Grant program provided financial assistance to non-profit shelter organizations that provided service to some of the County's most vulnerable residents, the unhoused. This program provided grants to non-profit organizations that provide free shelter beds to our unhoused population. Emergency Shelter providers have experienced significant negative impacts due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. The grants allowed the shelters to continue playing a critical role in the County's homelessness response system as they provide an immediate place to stay while individuals and families connect or reconnect to housing.

### ***Workforce Training Program***

This program provided job training support to residents who have been negatively impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. It is also an investment in the County's future workforce as we recover from the public health emergency.

### ***CDA Business Grants***

The program provided direct financial assistance to local businesses in the Unincorporated area of Alameda County who were negatively impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. This program consisted of Small Business Grants, Facade Improvement Loans, and Small Business Assistance. The Small Business Grants provided cash grant assistance to small businesses. The Facade Improvement Loans program provided forgivable loans to COVID-19 impacted businesses in Unincorporated Areas of the County (with a priority on Ashland and Cherryland) to improve vacant commercial properties to assist COVID-19 impacted landlords. The Small Business Assistance program provided funding for small businesses to expand and entrepreneur training for aspiring business owners. The program is limited to qualifying businesses and is focused on the Eden Municipal Advisory Council communities with a priority for services to Ashland and Cherryland.

### ***Community Financial Services***

The program provided financial services, including small business loans, low-cost check cashing, and financial education services, through community-based organizations and/or other non-profit organizations in the Eden Municipal Advisory Council communities in the Unincorporated Areas of Alameda County. Service providers must have a physical office and staff presence in the community and must have a focus on Ashland or Cherryland.

### ***Community Services Navigators***

Working in partnership with community coalitions, the community outreach and resource navigation project aimed to continue the Alameda County Health's efforts to support community recovery and resilience by focusing on addressing the economic and social impacts of those most severely impacted negatively by COVID-19—Black, African American, Latino/a/x, and other communities of color living in West & East Oakland, the San Pablo Corridor and North Livermore.

These funds created opportunities for small and large organizations to work together at the neighborhood level to support culturally competent, community-led resource navigation services. The project provided funding for comprehensive outreach and engagement as well as one step further in connecting the community to resources they need.

The coalitions will spend time connecting the community to resources and tracking if resources are accessed. In addition, various community events are being held to notify the community of available resources and bring services to where they are.

#### ***Minor Home Repairs – Lead Abatement***

This program provides funding for repair costs of healthy housing programs in communities hardest hit by the pandemic. Healthy housing programs are intended to reduce environmental hazards in homes that disproportionately impact low-income communities.

#### ***Housing & Child Care Capital Development***

This program is identifying and funding affordable housing and childcare development projects in the Unincorporated Areas of the County. Priority is given to projects in the areas that experienced the highest impacts from COVID-19.

#### ***Parks and Recreation***

- \$0.8M to Hayward Area Recreation and Park District, via sub-recipient agreement, to provide recreation services in parks, recreation centers, swim centers, community gardens, historic facilities and address park safety, healthy eating, food production, and other enhanced and equitable recreation services.

#### ***Financial Assistance – Landlords and Tenants***

##### **Landlord Assistance - \$2.6M Total**

- \$1.7M for Foreclosure Prevention Program to provide grants to 40-50 small or low-income property owners at-risk of foreclosure due to non-payment of rent during the COVID-19 eviction moratorium.
- \$0.9M for grants to 150-160 rental housing providers whose tenants were not Emergency Rental Assistance Program eligible or did not apply for ERAP.

##### **Tenant Emergency Financial Assistance - \$5.0M Total**

- \$5.0M for Augmented Emergency Financial Assistance Program to cover outstanding rent and other household necessities for 300-325 tenants.

### ***Supervisory Community Needs Grants***

These grants were intended to help offset the negative impact of the pandemic on local non-profit and business organizations. \$3.1 million was allocated to each of the five Supervisorial Districts for Community Needs Cash Aid Grants. To be eligible, an organization must have experienced a negative economic impact created by the COVID-19 emergency from the period of March 1, 2020, to the present. The intent is for grantees to reflect the geographic and cultural diversity of the County with a priority for organizations serving communities disproportionately impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

### ***Arts Grants***

The Alameda County Arts Relief Grants Program provided direct financial aid to support non-profit art and cultural organizations affected by the COVID-19 emergency. Through an open application process, approximately 200 organizations who meet qualifying criteria received a grant of \$2,000 to \$20,000. The majority of County arts organizations serve disproportionately impacted populations, and the grants were intended to assist the organizations with survival and sustainability.

### ***East Bay EDA Business Grants***

This program provided direct financial assistance to small, local and emerging businesses countywide who were negatively impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Eligible businesses shall have no more than 500 employees and must be a 'small business concern' as defined by section 3 of the Small Business Act. Grant funds must be used to mitigate financial hardships, however businesses in qualified census tracts may also use these funds to rehabilitate commercial properties or make property improvements.

### ***Capacity Building***

The Alameda County Health Public Health Department (ACPHD) aims to improve the health and well-being of all residents, especially the vulnerable and marginalized. To achieve this, ACPHD supports grassroots and Community-Based Organizations (CBOs) in underserved, low-income communities, particularly those disproportionately Black and Brown. Recognizing the expertise and trust these organizations have, ACPHD collaborates with CBOs to enhance their capacity to deliver culturally appropriate programs addressing health disparities and social determinants of health (SDOH). Capacity Development Projects provide CBOs with professional development, technical assistance, and essential services to meet the goal of a healthy Alameda County.

### ***Violence Prevention***

Violence is a serious public health issue in Alameda County. It impacts not only the individuals and families at the center of an incident, but also present hardships for the surrounding neighborhoods and communities subjected to the presence of violence. The Alameda County Board of Supervisors approved \$4.1M in ARPA funding to be used by Alameda County Public Health Department (ACPHD) for violence prevention and intervention activities. This act amplified the department's Chief Health Strategist role as convener to promote safety, resilience, and move violence prevention efforts forward.

### ***Outreach & Navigation***

The Outreach and Navigation program is dedicated to supporting communities most affected by the COVID-19 pandemic through 19 procurement contracts. These contracts aim to enhance access to essential services, improve equitable outcomes for people of color and extremely low-income households, strengthen support systems for residents in the unincorporated communities of Ashland, Castro Valley, Cherryland, Fairview, Hayward Acres, and San Lorenzo, and provide economic relief to local businesses. The service categories include: capacity-building (six contracts), housing and legal services (one contract), mainstream navigation services (one contract), other community services (five contracts), and affordable housing capacity building throughout the County (six contracts).

### ***Health Care Staffing***

Personnel costs for COVID-19 include dedicated positions in the Public Health Department and support staff in information systems, contracts, finance, communications, policy, and homelessness, County staff primarily support the following COVID-19 response services:

- Vaccination Unit – Maintain Points of Dispensing (PODs) for COVID-19 vaccines in neighborhoods with high transmission rates and/or low vaccination rates prioritizing settings such as school districts and care facilities. Staff work closely with community partners for outreach.
- Case Investigation and Community Support Unit – Coordinate contact tracing and case investigation as well as provide clinical guidance and connect individuals and families to care.
- Testing Unit – Establish and manage community testing contracts for vulnerable populations.
- Outbreak Investigations Unit – Investigate outbreaks and support prevention programs in high-risk settings.
- Data Unit – Provides data entry and epidemiology support. Staff also develop and maintain data dashboards.

## ***CDA Staff – Home Repair***

### **Repairs Rental Registry Staff**

Funding is supporting the staffing costs of developing a rental registration database and implementing a proactive rental inspection program to increase healthy housing in the Unincorporated Areas of Alameda County. This also includes the development of policies and procedures for areas most impacted by the pandemic.

### **Code Enforcement Staff**

The project is also providing funding for staffing costs of developing a proactive rental inspection program to ensure homes are healthy and free of lead-based hazards. This program has targeted communities hardest hit by the pandemic.

### **Minor Home Repairs Staff – Lead Abatement**

Another component of the project is providing funding for staff support for healthy housing repair programs. Healthy housing programs are intended to reduce environmental hazards in homes that disproportionately impact low-income communities.

## ***INFRASTRUCTURE***

Capital Project-Sewer Line Designs.

\$300,000 for design costs for the 5-mile unincorporated Livermore Sewer Extension Project. The project includes environmental clearance and design of a new sewer line that will connect the publicly owned Martinelli Center to a new sewer extension in the unincorporated Livermore area. The sewer extension project is needed to protect the ground water from high nitrates found in this area.

## ***REVENUE REPLACEMENT & TO BE ALLOCATED***

The \$8.9 million allocated for revenue replacement represents the amount the County will use of the standard allowance for revenue replacement. The revenue replacement funds were used to cover the services of the County's public safety staff. Funds were used to cover a portion of salaries and benefits of the public safety badge staff.

## **PROMOTING EQUITABLE OUTCOMES**

The COVID-19 pandemic has had a significant impact on Alameda County communities. Throughout the pandemic, the County has provided services and supports to protect our most vulnerable residents. The

County's approach to allocating ARPA funding continues this approach by seeking to reduce health disparities and allocate resources to communities most in need of recovery. In determining how to utilize ARPA funds and implementing ARPA programming, the County has:

- Utilized data to identify neighborhoods most impacted by COVID-19 and the resulting economic impacts.
- Analyzed COVID-19 demographic data to identify disproportionately impacted communities by geography, age, and race/ethnicity with regards to testing, case rates, hospitalizations, deaths, and vaccination rates.
- Partnered with 'community coalitions' to ensure the delivery of relevant services.

## COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

In keeping with the County's commitment to transparency and inclusive budgeting, the County encourages and has provided multiple opportunities for public participation in determining how ARPA funds are allocated. On August 17, 2021, the County held a public listening session to solicit community input on how to allocate ARPA funds. The community had the opportunity to provide written and/or public presentations of their proposals. In total, the County received over \$1.3 billion in proposals. The Board has since discussed and taken action on ARPA allocations and related items in public Board meetings. The Board's Municipal Advisory Councils allow unincorporated communities to elevate their unique needs to the Board. As projects are developed and implemented, they will incorporate feedback and input from the community.

## LABOR PRACTICES

Workforce practices must be reported for projects pursued under Expenditure Category 5: Water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure. The County's construction projects will follow the California Public Contract Code, including requirements to utilize a skilled and trained work force through prevailing wage. The strong labor standards as outlined in the California Public Contract Code promote effective delivery of infrastructure projects while supporting opportunities for a range of workers. Contractors will pay prevailing wages to their employees as well as any subcontractors. Contractors are encouraged to use good faith efforts to employ local residents and disadvantaged residents.

## USE OF EVIDENCE

The County prioritizes evidence-based practices and evaluates projects that employ new, innovative approaches. Specific performance data and evidence basis where applicable can be found on the individual project pages.
